Erik Erikson's Stages of Psychosocial Development

Psychosocial development theory is an expansion of Sigmund Freud's original five stages of development. Erikson, a 20th-century psychologist and psychoanalyst, formulated the eight-stage life cycle theory in 1959 on the supposition that the environment plays a critical role in self-awareness, adjustment, human development and identity.

Freud and the phallic stage: Freud believed that masculinity and femininity were learned during the phallic stage or psychosexual development. During the phallic stage, the child develops an attraction to the opposite sexed parent but after recognizing that that parent is unavailable, learns to model their own behavior after the same sexed parent.

This is because in terms of psychosocial development, many gifted children are underdeveloped. They have not fully experienced the emotions of shame, doubt, inferiority, and guilt, so they do not know how to handle these emotions when they do experience them. The fifth stage of Erik Erikson's theory of psychosocial development is identity vs. role confusion, and it occurs during adolescence, from about 12-18 years. During this stage, adolescents search for a sense of self and personal identity, through an intense exploration of personal values, beliefs, and goals.
